

Kustbevakningsflyget har gjort överflygningar och beräknar att oljan sträcker sig tre sjömil och har en bredd på 30 meter. Övervakningsfartyget KBV 312 är på plats och tar oljeprover för att bedöma typen av olja och om det är sanerbart.

Miljöräddningsfartyget KBV 010 från Göteborg är på väg mot platsen och beräknas vara framme under sen eftermiddag för att ta upp oljan om det är möjligt.

Oljan håller på och lösas upp och bedöms inte vara sanerbar. Miljöräddningsfartyget KBV 010 har återvänt mot Göteborg.









Figure 1 - Maximum extent of Arctic waters application (see paragraph G-3.3)2




Figure 2 - Maximum extent of Antarctic Waters application (see paragraph G-3.4)2

Discharge within special areas

All discharge of bilge water is prohibited in Antarctica. It is also prohibited in the Arctic as per the polar code for vessels constructed after 1 Jan 2017. Vessels constructed before 1 Jan 2017 must comply with the polar code requirements by the first intermediate or renewal survey, whichever comes first, after Jan 1 2018.

National legislations

Where can I use the bilge water separator?

- According to MARPOL 73/78 in: Sweden, Norway, Poland, Germany, Netherlands, France, UK, South Africa, Australia, Estonia, Japan.
- USA: Will be adressed separately
- Finland: outside 4 NM:
- Denmark, Lithuania: outside 12 NM
- Canada: According to MARPOL 73/78 except for: 5 ppm in inland waters & no discharge in arctic waters.

Act to Prevent Pollution from Ships (APPS)

This is the act used for Marpol violations. Each felony punishable with up to 10 years in jail and a fine up to USD 250.000 for an induvidual and USD 500.000 for a corporation for each violation.

U.S. COAST GUARD

The Clean Water Act

Prohibits discharge of oil and hazardous substances into the navigable waters of the USA or into the waters of the US contigous zone which is 200 nm from nearest land.

Sarbanes-Oxley act of 2002

Obstruction of justice is considered a very serious crime and the Sarbanes-Oxley act of 2002 may be used to prosecute a seafarer if evidence is willfully withheld or destroyed. This could be the Oil content Meter memory card, the Oil Record Book or other information that would be providinguse to teh investigation.

Witness tampering

If a crewmember or office representative threatens or intimidates a fellow crewmember to conceal, delay or bare false witness during an investigation it can be considered to be a witness tampering and can lead to fines or inprissonment.

Conspiracy

If two or more persons conspire to deraud the US government it can lead to fines and/or inprisonment.

U.S. COAST GUARD

Responsible Corporate Officer Doctrine

Fleet managers, Superintendents or other office managers or ship officers that were in a position to know or could prevent a violation may be held liable and prosecuted for teh violation even though it was comitted by someone else.

DSD Shipping Sentenced to Pay \$2.5 Million Over Illegal Discharges

Norwegian shipping company DSD Shipping has been sentenced to pay a total penalty of \$2.5 million as a result of its convictions in Mobile, Alabama, for obstructing justice, violating the Act to Prevent Pollution from Ships (APPS), tampering with witnesses and conspiring to commit these offenses.

The company was ordered to pay \$500,000 of the penalty to the Dauphin Island Sea Lab Foundation to fund marine research and enhance coastal habitats in the Gulf of Mexico and Mobile Bay.

DSD has also been placed on a three year term of probation and was ordered to implement an environmental compliance plan to ensure the company's vessels obeyed domestic and international environmental regulations in the future.

The companies could be fined up to \$500,000 per count, in addition to other possible penalties. Ignacio and Samson face a maximum penalty of 20 years in prison for the obstruction of justice charges.

Whistle blowers protection act.

Whistleblowers may be required up to half of the fines and could recieve six figure rewards for providing information.

Over 100 crew members have received APPS awards since mid 1990s
Over \$17 million USD awarded
Highest award was for \$2.1 million USD
Many awards were 25 to 30 times what the crewmember earns in a year.





Most of the investigations and prosecutions are initiated by whistle blowers

The whistleblower is rewarded under the Whistleblowers act and > 100 crew members have received APPS awards since mid 1990s.

Over \$17 million USD has been awarded and the highest award was for \$2.1 million USD.

This imposes a tremendous risk for the ship owners and ship managers.



US Judge Awards MARPOL Whistleblower \$462,500

The Department of justice will procedute the individuals <u>and</u> the company as per the False Statement Act, obstruction of justice, the tampering of witness, the conspiracy charge.

If convicted:

- Fines
- Possible imprisonment
- Probation to up to 5 years during which the company must implement an ECP- Environmental Compliance Plan.
- Continuous onboard inspections by a court appointed monitor that can lead to additional fines.
- Vessels might be banned from calling US ports.

>150 companies and individuals prosecuted and 1400 vessels subject to ECPs.

Aggressiveness of the Coast Guard and Department of Justice will not change

Measures to Avoid Whistleblowers

- Training programs
- Encourage internal reporting of noncompliance in open reporting systems
- Investigate reports and take action
- Reward internal reporting
- Superintendent ship visits reinforcing compliance message
- Ensure technical needs of vessel regarding pollution prevention equipment are addressed promptly
- Document what you do

Implement a program that aims to strengthen the corporate culture of compliance.

A program that strongly emphasizes both ethics and environmental compliance is good business!
